INTRODUCTION

Spokane County's Homeless Plan was created primarily to create a Homeless Crisis Response System for the rural and suburban homeless citizens throughout the county. Many of the goals, strategies, funding streams, and measurement tools are commonly shared between the City of Spokane and Spokane County. In fact, integrated into this plan is the City of Spokane *Strategic Plan to End Homelessness 2015-2020*. Homeless plans written before were actually joint planning efforts; however, in order to ensure that linkages, priorities, and assistance was given to the homeless outside of the City of Spokane, the Spokane County Homeless Plan was created. This plan, along with the goals and strategies within it, will allow the county to direct assistance more effectively to the rural and suburban homeless. We share the guiding community principle that no person should experience homelessness, but if a person does become homeless, it will be rare and brief.

The Spokane County Homeless Crisis Response System has undergone several transformations. Prior to 2008, Spokane County participated in the Balance of Washington State Continuum of Care (CoC), later establishing its own CoC. Then, the two continuums merged and became the Spokane City and County Continuum of Care (CoC). In addition to a shared CoC, the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) and Point-in-Time (PIT) Count are also merged. However, additional funding streams became available to Spokane County, mostly as a result of document recording fees collected and set aside for homeless housing and assistance. The City of Spokane, along with Spokane County, separate these funds and focus the use of these funds primarily within each of their respective jurisdictions. Some things such as a shared HMIS system and merged Continuum of Care make sense; however, a different approach is needed to solve the problem of rural homelessness. This plan, along with the funding streams dedicated to the rural and suburban areas of Spokane County, will allow us to bridge that gap.

Spokane County Homeless Crisis Response System

Spokane County promotes the mission, vision, and guiding principles of the Washington State Department of Commerce Homeless Housing Strategic Plan, The Spokane City and County CoC, and the City of Spokane Strategic Plan to End Homelessness.

DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

VISION

No person left living outside.

COMMERCE MISSION

Support homeless crisis response systems that efficiently reduce the number of people living outside, and that when scaled appropriately can house all unsheltered people.

COMMERCE GUIDING PRINCIPLES

- All people deserve a safe place to live.
- Urgent and bold action is the appropriate response to people living outside.
- Interventions must be data driven and evidence based.

Homeless crisis response systems respond to the immediacy and urgency of homelessness and make sure everyone has a safe and appropriate place to live. The system must also target and prioritize resources for people with the greatest needs so they are quickly "screened in" for housing assistance. The goal of a high functioning system is to reach the balance between need and capacity, often referred to as functional zero, so that when a person becomes homeless there is an immediate system response that quickly moves that person back into housing.

A homeless crisis response system prioritizes providing people with housing first and then offers additional supports and voluntary services as needed. This evidenced based, national best practice approach yields higher housing retention rates, lower returns to homelessness, and significant reductions in the use of crisis service and institutions.

CONTINUUM OF CARE

VISION

The Vision of the Spokane City and County CoC is to bring together resources and resourceful people who create a community where everyone has a safe, stable place to call home.

CONTINUUM OF CARE MISSION

The mission of the community-based

Spokane City and County CoC is to prevent and end homelessness in our area by fostering shared responsibility among stakeholders and coordinating resources essential to the success of local plans to end homelessness.

CITY OF SPOKANE STRATEGIC PLAN TO END HOMELESSNESS

VISION

No one should experience homelessness. No one should be without a safe, stable place to call home. Spokane Continuum of Care vision is to provide opportunities that enhance the quality of life for Spokane's extremely low to moderate income populations.

CORE BELIEFS

We believe access to housing is a basic human right, and homelessness contradicts the right to safe and adequate shelter. We believe acknowledging housing as a human rights issue improves how people who are experiencing homelessness are viewed and treated. These beliefs help set the proper context for addressing homelessness through approaches that extend dignity and protection to people and aim to re-establish their rights.

PRIMARY GOALS

Retool the homeless response system to:

- End Veteran homelessness by 2015
- End Chronic homelessness by 2017
- End Family homelessness by 2018



SPOKANE COUNTY'S HOUSING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DIVISION

MISSION STATEMENT

Spokane County, through its Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Affordable Housing Program (AHP), and other programs fund projects and conduct activities, which improve the quality of life for lower-income residents of Spokane County.

CONSOLIDATED PLAN PRINCIPLES

To guide the department in the furtherance of its mission statement, and in meeting HUD's statutory goals and objectives, the department has adopted the following guiding principles.

- 1. Priority to Lowest-Income Ensure the needs of people with the lowest-income are given priority consideration.
- 2. Basic Support Encourage the focus of public service resources on essential basic needs.
- 3. **Citizen Participation -** Provide opportunities for all public to participate in plan development, implementation, and evaluation.
- 4. Collaboration Encourage public, private, and non-profit sectors collaboration and reduce program duplication.
- 5. **Emphasize the Potential -** Build upon available community assets, resources, plans and market forces.
- 6. Leverage Leverage limited resources by promoting partnership between organizations.
- 7. Measurable Results Produce and evaluate measurable outcomes and results.
- 8. **Comprehensive** Engage comprehensive strategies to address the holistic needs of a neighborhood, household, or individual.

CORE ELEMENTS

Core elements of a high performing homeless crisis response system capable of bringing everyone inside:

- 1. People living unsheltered are promptly identified and engaged.
- 2. Diversion strategies are used first to solve a housing crisis. Family and friends are engaged if the situation is safe and appropriate.
- 3. People are prioritized based on need, using a transparent and consistently applied coordinated entry process.
- 4. Access to housing and services is contingent on rules no more restrictive than typical leases.
- 5. Housing and service goals are client driven.
- 6. Clients are supported in developing housing stability plans that address client safety, barriers to permanent housing, and self-sufficiency.
- 7. Programs quickly move most clients into market rate housing, and stay available as requested to maintain housing stability.
- 8. Programs provide the minimum assistance needed to secure housing and only offer more when it is necessary to prevent a return to homelessness.
- 9. Programs should intervene with permanent supportive housing when clients have a disability that impacts their ability to live independently, and market-rate housing placements have proven ineffective in resolving their homelessness.
- 10. Programs share client data between systems as allowable to improve coordination of services.

Spokane County is unique, certain streams of funding for the homeless populations are combined with the City of Spokane, and certain streams of funding are not. Due to the shared responsibility between the City of Spokane and Spokane County for the homeless populations, several tools, programs, and activities are merged. For example, the Homeless Management & Information System (HMIS) is used for all homeless activities, with the City of Spokane being the HMIS lead. The local Spokane City and County CoC was merged in 2008; prior to that time, these continuums operated as two separate entities. The Point-in-Time (PIT) count is completed jointly, under the direction of the CoC.

Homeless plans were initially developed jointly, with the *Spokane Regional 10-Year Plan to Address Homelessness* being published in 2005. That plan underwent a major revision in 2008 and was titled *The Road Home.* In 2015, the City of Spokane produced its own homeless plan titled *Strategic Plan to End Homelessness*. The City of Spokane's plan, including any amendments and/or updates, is incorporated as an appendix. While the goals, objectives, and many of the strategies in the *Strategic Plan to End Homelessness* will be incorporated, this plan will be used by Spokane County as it administers its separate funding streams specifically for county programs and/or citizens.

Along with the funding streams used to address the goals and strategies within in this plan, Spokane County's Homeless Plan will attempt to complement the City of Spokane goals and strategies. However, what is important to note, is that homelessness in the rural and suburban areas look very different than what homelessness looks like in the City of Spokane. The causes of homelessness in small towns are the same as in big cities: poverty, mental illness, inadequate housing, domestic violence and the psychological wounds of war, according to the <u>United States Interagency Council on Homelessness</u>. But rural areas are more likely to be poor, with limited transportation, making it that much harder for the homeless to get to a center that can provide counseling, a housing voucher, or medical care.

In the City of Spokane, it isn't hard to find homeless persons. They can be located sleeping under a bridge or in the park, pushing around overflowing shopping carts, or hanging around outside of existing homeless shelters. The rural homeless live in the woods, in tents or campers, in barns, and ice sheds. They crash on a friend's couch, or they're living in a shack with no heat, electricity, or running water; usually not far from where they were born and raised. Many of them are unemployed or underemployed. Often, they don't come forward for help because they are ashamed. Because they're not easily spotted, or they're not showing up for help at agencies, some advocates for the homeless argue that the rural homeless are being undercounted. When the rural homeless are being undercounted, it means they're not receiving the services and funding that are available to them.

Acronym and Definitions

The City of Spokane's *Strategic Plan to End Homelessness*, is incorporated into this document as an appendix, with the caveat that the most updated version of the plan will replace the outdated version. In instances where the two plans may contradict each other, the *Spokane County Homeless Plan* will take precedent for purposes of Spokane County Homeless Housing Assistance Act (HHAA) and/or Consolidated Homeless Grant (CHG) funding.

Glossary of Terms

- Affordable Housing: Affordable housing is generally defined as housing where the occupant is paying no more than thirty percent (30%) of their gross income for housing costs, including rent or mortgage, and utility costs.
- AIDS/HIV and Related Diseases: The disease of acquired immunodeficiency syndrome
 or any conditions arising from the etiologic agent for acquired immunodeficiency
 syndrome.
- **Alcohol/Other Drug Addiction:** A serious and persistent alcohol or other drug addiction that significantly limits a person's ability to live independently.
- Assisted Household or Person: For the purpose of identification of goals, an assisted household or person is one which during the period covered by the annual plan, will receive benefits through the Federal funds, either alone or in conjunction with the investment of other public or private funds. The program funds providing the benefit(s) may be from any funding year or combined funding years. A renter is benefited if the person takes occupancy of affordable housing that is newly acquired, newly rehabilitated, or newly constructed, and/or receives rental assistance through new budget authority. An existing homeowner is benefited during the year if the home's rehabilitation is completed. A first-time homebuyer is benefited if a home is purchased during the year. A homeless person is benefited during the year if the person becomes an occupant of transitional or permanent housing. A non-homeless person with special needs is considered as being benefited, however, only if the provision of supportive services is linked to the acquisition, rehabilitation, or new construction of a housing unit and/or the provision of rental assistance during the year. Households or persons who will benefit from more than one program activity must be counted only once. To be included in the goals, the housing unit must, at a minimum, satisfy the HUD Section 8 Housing Quality Standards (see 24 CFR section 88.2109).
- Chronically Homeless Person: An unaccompanied homeless individual with a disabling condition who has either been continuously homeless for a year or more or has had at least four episodes of homelessness in the past three years. To be considered chronically homeless, a person must have been sleeping in a place not meant for human habitation (e.g. living on the streets) and/or in an emergency shelter during that time.
- **Committed:** Generally means there has been legally binding commitment of funds to a specific project to undertake specific activities.
- Consolidated Plan (the Plan): The document that is submitted to HUD that serves as the comprehensive housing affordability strategy, community development plan, and submissions for funding under any of the Community Planning and Development formula grant programs (e.g., CDBG, ESG, HOME, and HOPWA), that is prepared in accordance with the process prescribed in this part.
- **Cost Burden > 30%:** The extent to which gross housing costs, including utility costs, exceed thirty percent (30 %) of gross income, based on data published by the U.S. Census Bureau.

- Cost Burden > 50%: (Severe Cost Burden): The extent to which gross housing costs, including utility costs, exceed fifty percent (50%) of gross income, based on data published by the U.S. Census Bureau.
- **Disabled Household:** A household in which a member is considered to have a disability by virtue of having a physical, mental, or emotional impairment that: (1) is expected to be of long-continued and indefinite duration, (2) substantially impedes his or her ability to live independently; and (3) is of such a nature that the ability could be improved by more suitable housing conditions. A person shall also be considered to have a disability if he or she has a developmental disability as defined in the Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act (42 U.S. C. 600-6006). The term also includes the surviving member or members of any household described in the first sentence of this paragraph who were living in an assisted unit with the deceased member of the household at the time of his or her death.
- Disabling Condition: For the purposes of chronic homelessness, a disabling condition
 is a diagnosable substance use disorder, serious mental illness, developmental disability,
 or chronic physical illness or disability, including the co-occurrence of two or more of these
 conditions. A disabling condition limits an individual's ability to work or perform one or
 more activities of daily living.
- Economic Independence and Self-Sufficiency Programs: Programs undertaken by Public Housing Agencies (PHAs) to promote economic independence and self-sufficiency for participating families. Such programs may include Project Self-Sufficiency and Operation Bootstrap Programs that originated under earlier Section 8 rental certificate and rental voucher initiatives. as well as the Family Self-Sufficiency Program. In addition, PHAs may operate locally developed programs or conduct a variety of special projects designed to promote economic independence and self-sufficiency.
- **Economic Opportunity:** Creation or retention of jobs for extremely low, very low, and low-income persons. Jobs created or retained will be accessible to affordable housing and will be promote long-term economic and social viability of, and particularly in the small cities and unincorporated areas.
- **Elderly Household:** For HUD rental programs, a one or two-person household in which the head of the household or spouse is at least 62 years of age.
- **Elderly Person:** A person who is at least 62 years of age.
- **Entitlement Area:** For purposes of the Spokane County Consolidated Plan, Annual Action Plans, and Spokane County Homeless Plan, entitlement area refers to Spokane County, exclusive of the City of Spokane.
- **Existing Homeowner:** An owner-occupant of residential property who holds legal title to the property, and who uses the property as his/her principal residence.
- **Extremely Low-Income Persons:** A member of a household that has a gross annual income at or below thirty percent (30%) of the area median annual income adjusted by household size.

- **Family:** See definition in 24 CFR 812.2 (The National Affordable Housing Act definition required to be used in the CHAS rule differs from the Census definition). The Bureau of Census defines a family as a householder (head of household) and one or more other persons living in the same household who are related by birth, marriage or adoption.
- Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) Program: A program enacted by Section 554 of the National Affordable Housing Act which directs Public Housing Agencies (PHAs) and Indian Housing Authorities (IHAs) to use Section 8 assistance under the rental certificate and rental voucher programs, together with public and private resources to provide supportive services to enable participating families to achieve economic independence and selfsufficiency.
- **Federal Preference for Admission:** The preference given to otherwise eligible applicants under HUD's rental assistance programs who, at the time they seek housing assistance, are involuntarily displaced, living in substandard housing, or paying more than 50 percent of family income for rent. (See, 24 CFR 882.219).
- **First-Time Home Buyer:** An individual or family who has not owned a home during the three-year period preceding the HUD-assisted purchase of a home that must be used as the principal residence of the home buyer, except that any individual who is a displaced homemaker (as defined in 24 CFR 92), or single parent (as defined in 24 CFR 92), may not be excluded from consideration as a first-time home buyer on the basis that the individual, while a homemaker or married, owned a home with his or her spouse or resided in a home owned by the spouse.
- FmHA: The Farmers Home Administration, or programs it administers.
- For Rent: Year round housing units that are vacant and offered/available for rent. (U.S. Census definition).
- For Sale: Year round housing units, which are vacant, and offered/available for sale only. (U.S. Census definition).
- **Frail Elderly:** An elderly person who is unable to perform at least 3 activities of daily living (i.e., eating, dressing, bathing, grooming, and household management activities). (See 24 CFR 889.105).
- **Group Quarters:** Facilities providing living quarters that are not classified as housing units. (U.S. Census definition). Examples include: prisons, nursing homes, College or University dormitories, military barracks, and shelters.
- **Homeless Persons:** A member of a household who due to lack of income, eviction, physical or mental disability, family crisis, or other event or situation, is unable to independently obtain permanent standard quality affordable housing.
- Homeless Family: An unsheltered family that includes at least one parent or guardian, and one child under the age of 18, a homeless pregnant woman, or a homeless person in the process of securing legal custody of a person under the age of 18.

- **Homeless Individual:** An unsheltered, unaccompanied youth (17 years or younger), or an adult (19 years or older) without children.
- **Homeless Youth:** An unaccompanied person 17 years of age or younger who is living in situations described by terms "sheltered" or "unsheltered".
- Household: One or more persons occupying a single housing unit (U.S. Census definition). See also "Family".
- Housing Unit: An occupied or vacant house, apartment, or a single room (SRO housing), that is intended as separate living quarters. (U.S. Census definition).
- Infrastructure and Other Public Improvements: Includes but is not limited to, water and sewer systems, streets, bridges, sidewalks, storm drainage systems, parks and recreation facilities, and fire stations and equipment.
- **Institutions/Institutional:** Group quarters for persons under care or custody. (U.S. Census definition).
- **Large Related:** A household of 5 or more persons that includes at least one person related to the householder by blood, marriage, or adoption.
- **Lead-Based Paint Hazard:** Any condition that causes exposure to lead from lead-contaminated dust, lead-contaminated soil, lead-contaminated paint, that is deteriorated or present in accessible surfaces, friction surfaces, or impact surfaces, that would result in adverse human health effects as established by the appropriate Federal agency. (Residential Lead-Based Paint Hazard Reduction Act of 1992 definition).
- LIHTC: (Federal) Low Income Housing Tax Credit.
- **Lower-Income:** Households whose total income does not exceed eighty percent (80%) of the median income for the area, as determined by HUD with adjustments for family size NOTE: HUD income limits are updated annually and are available from local HUD offices.
- **Median Family Income (MFI)**: The household income amount in a statistical area (Spokane County) that represents the dollar amount that falls between an equal number of lower and higher incomes. HUD usually revises the Spokane area's median income annually, based upon a variety of economic factors and census data. As of March 19, 2009, the area median income for a household of 4 persons is \$60,200.
- **Middle Income:** Households whose incomes are between eighty-one percent (85%) and ninety-five percent (95%) of the median income for the area, as determined by HUD, with adjustments for family size.
- **Minority Persons:** Persons who are Black, Hispanic, Native American, Alaska Natives, Asian, or Pacific Islanders.

- Persons with Special Needs: Includes persons who are elderly, frail elderly, developmentally disabled, physically disabled, or victims of domestic violence. Also includes persons who have HIV/AIDS, severe mental illness, or alcohol/substance addictions.
- **Non-Institutional:** Group quarters for persons not under care or custody. (U.S. Census definition used).
- Occupied Housing Unit: A housing unit that is the usual place of residence of the occupant(s).
- Other Household: A household of one or more persons that does not meet the definition of a Small Related Household, Large Related Household, or Elderly Household.
- Other Vacant: Vacant year-round housing units that are not For Rent or For Sale. This category would include Awaiting Occupancy or Held.
- **Over Crowded:** A housing unit containing more than one person per room. (U.S. Census definition).
- **Owner:** A household that owns (holds legal title), the housing unit it occupies. (U.S. Census definition).
- **Physical Defects:** A housing unit lacking complete kitchen or bathroom (U.S. Census definition). Jurisdictions may expand upon the Census definition.
- **Project-Based (Rental) Assistance:** Rental Assistance provided for a project, not for a specific tenant. Tenants receiving project-based rental assistance give up the right to that assistance upon moving from the project.
- **Public Housing CIAP:** Public Housing Comprehensive Improvement Assistance Program.
- **Public Housing MROP:** Public Housing Major Reconstruction of Obsolete Projects.
- Rent Burden > 30% (Cost Burden): The extent to which gross rents, including utility costs, exceed thirty percent (30%) of gross income, based on data published by the U.S. Census Bureau.
- Rent Burden > 50% (Severe Cost burden): The extent to which gross rents, including utility costs, exceed fifty percent (50%) of gross income, based on data published by the U.S. Census Bureau.
- **Rental Assistance**: Rental assistance payments provided as either project-based rental assistance or tenant-based rental assistance.
- **Renter:** A household that rents the housing unit it occupies, including both units rented for cash, and units occupied without cash payment of rent. (U.S. Census definition).

- Renter Occupied Unit: Any occupied housing unit that is not owner occupied, including units rented for cash and those occupied without payment of cash rent.
- Rural Homelessness Grant Program: Rural Homeless Housing Assistance Program, which is authorized by Subtitle G, Title IV of the Stewart B. McKinney Homeless Assistance Act.
- **Section 215:** Section 215 of Title II of the National Affordable Housing Act. Section 215 defines "affordable" housing projects under the HOME program.
- Service Needs: The particular services identified for special needs populations, which
 typically may include transportation, personal care, housekeeping, counseling, meals,
 case management, personal emergency response, and other services to prevent
 premature institutionalization and/or assist individuals to continue living independently.
- **Severe Mental Illness:** A serious and persistent mental or emotional impairment that significantly limits a person's ability to live independently.
- **Sheltered:** Families and persons whose primary nighttime residence is a supervised publicly or privately operated shelter, including emergency shelters, transitional housing for the homeless, domestic violence shelters, residential shelters for runaway and homeless youth, and any hotel/motel/apartment voucher arrangement paid because the person is homeless. This term does not include persons living doubled up or in overcrowded or substandard conventional housing. Any facilities offering permanent housing are not shelters, nor are its residents homeless.
- **Small Related:** A household of 2 to 4 persons that includes at least one person related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption.
- **Substandard Condition and not Suitable for Rehab:** By local definition, dwelling units that are in such poor conditions to be neither structurally nor financially feasible for rehabilitation.
- Substandard Condition but Suitable for Rehab: By local definition, dwelling units that do not meet standard conditions but are both financially and structurally feasible for rehabilitation. This does not include units that require only cosmetic work, correction, or minor livability problems or maintenance work. The jurisdiction must define this term (i.e., standard condition, financially and structurally feasible for rehab), and include this definition in the Appendix (Glossary of Terms) portion of its CHAS submission.
- **Substantial Rehabilitation:** Rehabilitation of residential property at an average cost for the project in excess of \$25,000 per dwelling unit.
- **Supportive Housing:** Housing, including Housing Units and Group Quarters, which have supportive environments and includes a planned service component.

- Supportive Service Need in FSS Plan: The plan that PHAs administering a Family self-sufficiency program are required to develop to identify the services they will provide to participating families and the source of funding for those services. The supportive services may include child care, transportation, remedial education, education for completion of secondary or post-secondary schooling, job training, preparation and parenting skills, money management and household management, counseling in homeownership, job development and placement, follow-up assistance after job placement, and other appropriate services.
- **Supportive Services:** Services provided to persons for the purpose of facilitating a quality, independent lifestyle. Some examples are case management, medical or psychological counseling and supervision, childcare, transportation, and job training.
- **Tenant-Based Rental Assistance:** A form of rental assistance in which the assisted tenant may move from a dwelling unit and still retain a claim for continued assistance. The assistance is provided for the tenant, not for the project.
- **Total Vacant Housing Units:** Unoccupied year round housing units. (U.S. Census definition).
- **Unsheltered:** Families and individuals whose primary nighttime residence is a public or private place not designed for, or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings (e.g., streets, parks, alleys).
- Vacant Awaiting Occupancy or Held: Vacant year round housing units that have been rented or sold, and are currently awaiting occupancy, and vacant year round housing units that are held by owners or renters for occasional use. (U.S. Census definition).
- **Vacant Housing Unit:** Unoccupied year-round housing units that are available or intended for occupancy at any time during the year.
- **Very Low-Income:** A member of a household who's (the households) income does not exceed fifty percent (50%) of the median Spokane area income determined annually by HUD, with adjustments for family size.
- Year Round Housing Units: Occupied and vacant housing units intended for year round use. (U.S. Census definition). Housing units for seasonal or migratory use are excluded.
